AN ACT relating to relating to elections; requiring a 1 runoff election after a primary election for specified 2 offices when no candidate receives a majority of the vote; 3 changing the date for primary elections; amending related 4 dates; making conforming changes; amending election 5 contribution laws; authorizing a report; providing that the 6 act is contingent on a constitutional amendment; and 7 providing for effective dates. 9 Be It Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming: 10

12 Section 1. W.S. 22-5-601 is created to read:

1 ARTICLE 6 2 RUNOFF ELECTIONS 3 4 22-5-601. Runoff elections for nominations. 5 (a) For nominations for governor, secretary of state, 6 state treasurer, state auditor, state superintendent of 7 public instruction, candidate for the state legislature and 8 any federal office, a runoff election shall be held with 9 respect to that nomination if no candidate receives more 10 than fifty percent (50%) of the votes of those voting on 11 the respective partisan primary ballot.
